Nundle Easi Access Walk project has just had a boost to its funds. A Bowls day was held, on behalf of this project, by the Nundle Sport & Recreation Club on Saturday, 22 February 2014.

27 bowlers attended from Kootingal, West Tamworth, North Tamworth, Nundle Fishing Club and Nundle Bowl's clubs. The Nundle Fishing Club members donated their time and food.

Other volunteers provided a morning tea and helped in all manner of ways to make the day run smoothly.

14 prizes were donated for raffles and one prize for the winning team consisting of four items each from the Good Guys at Tamworth and one prize for non bowlers who paid for their lunch from the Volcania Art Glass shop in Nundle.

There was a display prepared by Joy Carr, member of the Nundle Access Group, which explained in detail the project with photos and letters. Businesses in Tamworth and Nundle were approached via a letter explaining the project and an artist's sketch of the finished path.

Money was collected for entries which included morning tea & lunch; Non bowlers paid \$10 each for morning tea and lunch, Raffles, for "spider" competition where everyone bowls to get closest to the jack bowling on the wrong bias, straight donations were received from 2 people and sale of left over food donations.

The net result was \$878.00 which will not only add to the funds, but give the project further publicity.

FREE RECYCLING

There are 3 bins located at the Nundle Office to recycle for FREE:

Household dry cell batteries AA, AAA, C, D, button batteries, rectangular 6V and 9V. These are sent to a metal waste contractor and any funds received are then used to progress the Council's Recycle programs

Mobile phones are sent to Mobile Muster where all parts are recycled (take your sim card out before leaving them)

Printer toner cartridges which are sent to Planet Ark which are also recycled and turned into new things like plastic rulers

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN 'BEST BEFORE DATES' AND 'USE BY DATES'

A best before date is applied to food products that don't immediately become unsafe once the best before date has expired. **Use by date** is the last day that the product can be sold and consumed safely. Selling a product or displaying a product for sale after its use by date is an offence under the Food Act 2003. Cold meats, dairy products etc. Must display use by date.

REMEMBER: IF UNCERTAIN ABOUT FOOD, THE OLD SAYING APPLIES WHEN IN DOUBT THROW IT OUT
