As we approach the completion of the first four-year term of Tamworth Regional Council created by amalgamation of the former Shires of Barraba, Manilla, Nundle, Parry and Tamworth City Council on 17 March 2004, it is my great honour to provide a record of some of the achievements of the Council during this period of unification, growth and development.

I wish to place on record and acknowledge the significant contribution of the General Manager, Glenn Inglis, in driving significant change and unifying the culture and work ethic of the staff of five different organisations following the amalgamation. I congratulate Glenn, the Senior Staff and all of the Staff for the way they have embraced this major cultural change.

The following is but a brief summary of some of the highlights and achievements of Tamworth Regional Council over the past four years.

- In terms of infrastructure, the Australian Equine and Livestock Events Centre is without doubt the single most significant piece of infrastructure ever built within regional New South Wales and arguably Australia. It will provide significant economic benefits for the City of Tamworth, the Regional Council Area and North Western New South Wales. It will develop to be the single biggest contributor to the economy of the Tamworth Regional Council area.
- Council has shown a strong commitment to the Performing Arts. Tamworth will have a new performing arts centre to be known as the Capitol within the next few weeks and will be fully operational by the end of the year. The theatre is being fitted out and furnished at a cost of \$1.6million by TRC as part of a 15-year lease with the developer of the new Brisbane Street Shopping Complex. It has a 405-seat

auditorium with two levels of tiered seating and includes professional theatre lighting, full sound system, dressing rooms, orchestra pit, a fly tower and is fully air conditioned. It is a multi-function space for live theatre and cinema productions and will significantly add to existing cultural facilities by providing an ideal forum for live theatre including dance, drama, music, educational activities, conferences and community events.

- Over the past financial year, the Tamworth Region has recorded another year of significant growth with Council figures showing over \$211 million in total development approvals. Statistics released put the value of new homes approved in 07/08 at \$61million with commercial development at nearly \$36million in the same year. This compares most favourably with \$192 million for 2006/2007 financial year and \$155 million for the 2005/2006 financial year in total development approvals.
- By the end of the current financial year, Tamworth Regional Council in its 4 years of existence will have replaced 18 timber bridges – 8 on Local Roads and 10 on Regional Roads – at total cost of \$10 million. This renewal of vital transport infrastructure will reduce travel time and distance across the Regional Council area and has restored vital heavy vehicle transport links to the rural community where bridge weight limits once applied.
- Long-term planning of the Hills Plain Rural Residential area has been completed which will provide for up to 4,000 rural residential lots and a population of over 10,000 when fully developed. The Hills Plain Project will provide significant opportunities for residential growth of the City of Tamworth and provide a myriad of residential choices.
- Successful tendering of the Effluent Reuse Scheme will cater for the industrial and residential growth of the City of Tamworth for many years into the future and will provide significant environmental improvement of the health of our rivers and waterways.
- The completion of the Draft Tamworth Regional Local Environmental Plan has seen the combining of five former local government environmental plans into one integrated comprehensive local environmental plan which will provide a blue print for land use across the Region and has the potential to be the Council's greatest achievement in terms of regional urban and rural land use planning.
- Council has coordinated an enormous investment in water supply infrastructure for the Regional Council Area through combining and applying the financial resources of a single water utility to address the water supply infrastructure needs of the City of Tamworth and surrounding urban communities. There has been significant upgrade of the Bendemeer Water Supply Scheme and identification of the need for quality and quantity upgrade of the Barraba Water Supply. A commitment has been given by the Council to upgrading Chaffey Dam not only for the City of Tamworth but also for irrigators within the Peel Valley.
- Councillors and staff have made a concerted effort to maintain the identity of small communities within the Regional Council area, particularly the towns of Manilla, Nundle and Barraba. The identity of other urban communities such as Kootingal, Bendemeer and Moonbi has also been enhanced. A significant contributing factor in maintaining this identity has been through the establishment of Community Development Committees. Presently community development committees are established in Nundle, Manilla, Barraba, Bendemeer, Kootingal and Moonbi. CDCs provide a great opportunity for community feedback on Council's performance and direct input of the community's expectations of the Council. Tamworth Regional Council is on record as having the highest number of operating Section 355 Committees of any local government authority in the State.
- Another prominent feature of the 4 years of the Council is the dedication and commitment to Sport and Recreation planning and the provision of new infrastructure for junior rugby league, soccer and basketball.

- The Taminda Revitalisation Industrial Strategy is the culmination of a dream and a long-term vision for the Taminda area which will see the revitalisation of this area into a significant economic driver within the economy of Tamworth. The completion of the Taminda Flood Levy will secure protection of the area from flooding and provide significant opportunities for investment, growth and development of the overall area.
- Council has been successful in attracting a developer for construction of a new state of the art Regional Livestock Marketing Centre which will satisfy the latest requirements for animal welfare and environmental protection.
- Refurbishment of the Council's Manilla Branch Office to incorporate library services has seen the integration and one stop arrangement for a full range of customer services on offer for the residents of Manilla.
- Council's Barraba Branch Office has been designated as an Archive Centre for the storage and safekeeping of Council's records and documents. Land has been purchased adjacent to the Barraba Office and will provide an opportunity for Council to develop a commercial Records Storage and Archive Centre.
- The Council's finances and budgets have been astutely managed to place Council in a very solid and favourable financial position. Fortunately and unlike many councils in the State, Council has had no real exposure to the US sub prime mortgage crisis which has besieged and decimated global financial markets. Council's investment portfolio is a strong performer and the total investment cover has hovered around \$100m for many months. Council's financial and governance custodianship over the past four years, both at an elected and staff level will provide for a strong, vibrant, healthy and financially viable operation to be handed over to the incoming Council after the election to be held on 13 September 2008.
- Public confidence in the Council has been instilled by the way the Council has managed its operations. Senior staff time and resources have not been wasted with frivolous complaints which have allowed the staff to move forward with confidence as strong advocates for the Council, the community and the Region.
- Without doubt, the crowning achievement of the Council is the great unity and mutual respect elected members have forged with each other as the governing body of Tamworth Regional Council. Despite robust debate and differing opinion, mutual respect between councillors has been maintained at all times which has allowed the Council to move forward with a strong and unified determination. Coupled with this great unity and cohesion is the respect councillors have developed and hold for the independence and professionalism of the staff of Tamworth Regional Council.
- Last but not least, may I thank the community of the Regional Council area who have embraced and accepted many changes over the past 4 years. The community has provided a clear message to the Council of how they wish to see our natural and built environments conserved and sustainably managed and the opportunities to be pursued for development, growth and investment within the Region.
