Strategic Alignment

Tamworth Regional Council's sport and recreation strategic direction is influenced by a number of strategies. **The Nundle Recreation Ground and Peel River Park 2024 Masterplan** aligns with the planned population growth identified in Council's **Blueprint 100** Strategy and the needs associated with passive recreation and facility requirements identified in Council's **Sport and Recreation Strategic Plan.**

Tamworth Regional Blueprint 100

Tamworth Regional Council has embarked on a process to draw all its efforts toward a coordinated approach for future planning and infrastructure delivery. This has been coined **Blueprint 100**. It encompasses the Local Strategic Planning Statement, Growth Management Strategy and other council initiatives. **Blueprint 100** is a strategy to guide future use of land within the region towards a population of 100,000 people.

For the Council area, it will ensure that there is sufficient infrastructure and opportunities for jobs growth and great places for people to live.

Tamworth Regional Council acknowledges the contribution open space brings to the community and places high value on the benefits that engagement in passive and active recreation brings to the community.

Blueprint 100 takes into account the design of all open space and the needs of the growing community in relation to structured and unstructured recreation.

Sport and Recreation Strategic Plan

Dovetailing with **Blueprint 100**, Council's **Sport and Recreation Strategic Plan** provides a road map for planning and developing sport and recreation facilities (structured and unstructured) across the Tamworth region to align with the planned growth identified in **Blueprint 100**. This

will ensure Council is prepared to service the future recreation needs of the community and visitors to the Council area.

Action 4.6 of the **Sport and Recreation Strategic Plan** is "Prepare a masterplan to guide the enhancement of facilities at Nundle Recreation Ground to ensure that facilities are provided to a high standard and meet the needs of the community. Consult with the community and current/potential future user groups to consider the needs of both organised sport and active recreation, including the requirement for a youth activity space in Nundle".

Peel River Park

Project Scope

The scope of the **Nundle Recreation Ground and Peel River Park 2024 Masterplan** is to create a Masterplan that will guide the development of these areas to ensure they remain and grow, in line with Councils **Open Space Management Guide**, as significant locations for locals and tourism.

Project Objectives

- Integrate the Nundle Recreation Ground and Peel River Park 2024 Masterplan with Tamworth Regional Blueprint 100.
- To identify and address existing issues within the study area.

This Master Plan is considered to be a living document and is to be used as a guide for the future development of **Nundle Recreation Ground and Peel River Park.**

The Masterplan acknowledges **Nundle Recreation Ground and Peel River Park** are utilised to facilitate a broad range of activities from structured to unstructured sport and recreational pursuits that span from both passive to active. Addressing this broad spectrum will lead to the masterplan's success. This masterplan provides options for the actions precinct to be implemented in stages allowing for specific elements to be prioritised as funding becomes available or if community needs or demands change.





Site analysis

A broad analysis of all relevant existing conditions in the study area was undertaken. The site analysis included a physical overview of the study area including onsite inspections, a photographic study and assessment of existing open space facilities, structures and connections to and between the study area and its context.

An ongoing vegetation maintenance program is essential to provide for long-term success of the environment at Nundle Recreation Ground and **Peel River Park,** along with regular monitoring to detect any issues with the health of trees.

Operational management is critical to the short, medium and long term success of Nundle Recreation Ground and Peel River Park. Both localities have a clear operational focus of community recreation and tourism with the goal of maximising usage and promoting the area. This will ensure all investment in both localities has a broader flow on effect of social and economic benefits into the community at large.

Flooding




Fig 1. Nundle Recreation Ground flood map

As depicted in Fig 1 and Fig 2, 2012 flood studies indicate both the **Nundle Recreation Ground and Peel River Park** are prone to flooding, with approximately 80% of the study area at risk of 1.5m of flood water. The masterplan will acknowledge this in all facets of design and proposals.

Nundle Recreation Ground is located on the left-hand side of Oakenville Street at the entrance to Nundle. Boarded to the north and west by the Peel River, the recreation ground includes:

- Sports Oval
- Canteen

- Established shade trees
- Viewing mound
- Wheel chair access from the east
- Synthetic cricket wicket
- Public toilets
- Footpath on the perimeter
- Seating
- · Access to the river
- Club house
- Sports field lights
- Water refill station
- Informal carparking

The recreation ground is used throughout the year by the local primary school for sporting events and is a home ground for the local bush cricket team. The public toilets are a very popular rest stop for travellers. It is important to note the Recreational ground is used as a landing site for helicopters in times of an emergency.

Peel River Park is located on the right-hand side of Oakenville Street at the entrance to Nundle. Boarded by the Peel River on the west, Peel River Park includes:

- Footpath
- River access
- Picnic tables
- BBOs

Crown Land

Nundle Recreation Ground





Fig 3. Crown Land

The Nundle Recreation Ground is partially located on Crown Reserve 32997 for the purpose of public recreation and Crown Reserve 32179 for the purpose of access (Refer Fig. 3). Tamworth Regional Council is the gazetted Crown Land Manager for Reserve 32997 only; there is no gazetted Crown Land Manager for Reserve 32179 and as such, management has defaulted to the Minister for Land and Housing.

Peel River Park

Peel River Park is located within Crown Reserve 32180 for the purpose of access (Refer Fig. 3). There is no gazetted Crown Land Manager for Reserve 32180 and as such, management has defaulted to the Minister for Land and Housing.

If Council wishes to undertake any improvements to Reserve 32179 or Reserve 32180, consent from the department would be required. Alternatively, Council may wish to seek appointment as the Crown Land Manager for these reserves.

Reserves 32179 and 32180 are both subject to Aboriginal Land Claims which are currently undetermined. Concurrence of the NSWALC is required prior to undertaking works on this part of the reserve. If the land is found to be claimable against the criteria, the Minister for Crown Lands must grant the claim and title of the land and any improvements on the land transfers to the relevant Local Aboriginal Land Council.

Peel River Park also comprises of a Crown public road as shown in red outline on Fig. 3. If Council wishes to undertake works on the road, consent from Crown Lands under the relevant section of the Roads Act, 1993 would be required. A licence may also be required to authorise occupation of the road. Alternatively, Council may wish to request transfer of the road to their authority.

All reserves noted are within the Gomeroi Native Title Claim area lodged 20 December 2011. Advice should be sought from Council's Native Title Manager prior to undertaking activities on the reserves to ensure compliance with the Commonwealth Native Title Act, 1993.




