







In 1913 he successfully contested New England as a Liberal candidate and returned the following year in the Federal election and again in 1917 while absent on active service. At the time of enlistment he lived at Marius St, Tamworth and in the collection's slide he is shown with his family: wife Martha Addison and children Mary b1910 and Doris b1912.</p> <p>He enlisted 4 January 1916 at Armidale and embarked aboard the HMAT A74 'Marathon' on 4 May 1916 as part of B Company 33rd Battalion. During the journey Thomas was promoted to Lance Corporal, but reverted back to Private on 16 July.</p> <p>21 November 1916, the 33rd Battalion proceeded via Southampton to Havre, France arriving in Steenwerck on the 24th and moving into the trenches at Chapelle d'Armentieres on the 27th. Thomas was with the Battalion during the infamous trench warfare endured in the cold temperatures of the battle of Messines in Belgium and was wounded 9 June 1917, receiving wounds to his left arm and discharged on 17 June.</p> <p>Thomas was part of the advance on Passchendaele Ridge during the 3rd Battle of Ypres in Belgium and then promoted to Lance Corporal on 16 November 1917. After illness and leave, he was wounded in action, gassed, 18 April 1918 near Villers-Bretonneux, France. Thomas returned to Australia on the 'Mahana' arriving 12 November 1919.</p> <p>Thomas and Martha divorced 1929. On the 6.9.1915 at the age of 21 years and 2 months Jack enlisted at Armidale and was placed into the 16th Reinforcements of the 3rd Battalion A.I.F. On April 1st 1916 he along with the rest of the 3rd Battalion embarked for the war on board the SS "Makarini" bound for the Suez.</p> <p>Jack survived the war relatively unscathed although he was wounded 4 times. He disembarked in Suez on 2.5.1916. On the 25.7.1916 he was transferred to the 1st Training Battalion and sent to Perhem Downs in England and 9 days later on the 3rd of August 1916 was taken on strength in France. Jack saw action in the Somme Valley and at Amiens. He was wounded in action on the 18.8.1916 and sent to the Hospital at Etaples and later Camiers. He had also contracted VD which put him out of action for some 43 days. By the 30.12.1916 he had rejoined his unit. Little more is heard of him until he is once again wounded in action on 4.10.1917 which required more hospitalisation. This wound was a bit more serious however but not life threatening. He was again wounded in action on 25.3.1918 and transferred to England on 30.3.1918 for treatment for a shrapnel wound to the right arm and was placed into various areas during this time of rehabilitation.</p> <p>On 22.9.1918 he was back in France and taken on strength in the field. His documents show that he along with his unit remained behind in France after the Armistice and into the early months of 1919 more than likely were engaged in mopping up operations. For his service he was awarded the British War Medal and the Victory Medal</p> <p>Jack also enlisted in the Citizens Military Forces during the Second World War. His serial Number was N163250. They played only a minor part in the fighting during the August Offensive but they remained on the peninsula until the evacuation on 20 December 1915. Following further training in Egypt, the 20th Battalion was sent to France, arriving there on 22 March 1916. From there it proceeded to a position near Pozieres, where it took up position in the trenches in April. Later, in July and August the 20th took part in the Battle of Pozieres, during which time it served in the line twice before moving to a quieter sector in Belgium for a period of rest. In October, however, the entire 2nd Division was moved to the south again and put back into the line in France once again and in November they launched an attack at Flers, in conditions that were so muddy that they were described by the official historian, Charles Bean, as "the worst ever encountered by the AIF".</p> <p>Throughout 1917 the 20th Battalion was involved in three major battles as the German Army was forced back towards the Hindenburg Line, seeing action at Bullecourt in May, Menin Road in September and Poelcappelle in October. At Lagnicourt, on 15 April, along with other units from the 5th Brigade, they took part in a defensive action along with four other battalions, where they managed to defeat a counter-attack by a German force almost five times its size. In 1918, the battalion was involved in repelling the German Spring Offensive, when the 20th was one of many Australian battalions that were hurried in to the line to stop it, and on 7 April 1918, they took part in a very sharp engagement at Hangard Wood. Once the German offensive was defeated, the Allies launched their own, known as the Hundred Days Offensive which eventually brought about an end to the war. 

For these offences he was awarded 7 days confinement to camp and the forfeit of 2 days pay. He was reclassified medically as C1 - "Fit for Home Service only". Stanley reported sick to the 1st AWH at Bulford on 9 February 1917 with VD and was transferred to the No1 VD Hospital at Parkhouse. He was discharged 7 April, after 58 days, to the Convelesence Training Company at Parkhouse. He proceeded to the 1st Training Battalion at Lark Hill, Durrington on the 6th May 1917. At the Durrington he was charged with being AWL from midnight 3-6-17 to 6.30pm 8-6-17 and overstaying leave. For these offences he was awarded 4 days FP (field punishment) and forfeit of 21 days pay (£5-5-0) - he had been held in custody 9 days awaiting his trial. Stanley transferred from the Durrington Camp to the No2 Command Depot at Weymouth on the 28th July. There he was classified medically as C3 - 'Permanently Unfit for service'. At Weymouth he was charged with 'neglect to obey Garrison Orders in that he was absent on 1.9.17 from tatoo till arrested at 12.30am on 2.9.17 without a pass from his CO". For this offence he was awarded 7 days field punishment No2 and the forfeit of 9 days pay.</p> <p>He embarked aboard the HT 'Coriuthic' 10 January 1918, for his return to home and discharged 18 May 1919 in Sydney.
